5th Grade Transition

To help students adjust to life in middle school, we have implemented several activities to assist students as they move from their elementary schools into their new home at the middle school. We are always considering more programs to help with the transition. Please let Mrs. Harvey know if you have suggestions.

- Several opportunities to attend tours of the middle school and walk a "day in the life" of a

- In the 5th grade hallway of the middle school, a bank of lockers is available all summer so students can practice opening a locker.

Middle School Schedule Start & End Times

The middle school opens its doors for students at 7:35 AM, with classes starting at 8:00 AM. Attendance is taken with the Block 1 teacher. The school day ends at 2:50 PM. After 3:00 PM, students are not permitted in the building unless supervised by an adult.

Our middle school Lower House schedule has three academic blocks. These comprise our Math, Language Arts and Science/Social Studies courses. There is also a 45-minute Elective & a 45-minute Unified Arts period scheduled each day. These periods are for "specials". The 5th grade teams also end their day with a short "Viking Time" period for support and intervention. We look forward to utilizing Viking Time to support all of our students with their varying needs. Lunch Time

At the middle school, we have 4 lunch periods, the lunch period is 30 minutes in length. Our 5th grade lunch is scheduled from 11:38 -12:08.

Lockers

We will have a bank of lockers available for the entire summer for students to practice their locker combination skills. The combinations are posted on the lockers, feel free to stop in throughout the summer. The only times lockers would not be available is when our custodians are cleaning the floors and/or hallways.

Other details... Each student is assigned a locker with combination locks. The general use locker is located near the student's academic team rooms. Students are able to secure all personal belongings and should share their locker combinations with <u>NO ONE</u>.

The school assumes no responsibility and will not reimburse students for any personal article, equipment or cash that is lost or stolen from any locker. Each student is to use only the locker assigned to them, and no student should allow another person to use their locker or to learn their combination. Lockers are to be kept clean and orderly; each student is responsible for any damage to the lock or locker assigned them. Lockers may be reassigned or revoked for various reasons. Problems should be reported to the Main Office.

The Upper Merion Area School District retains special rights regarding lockers; students and their parents/guardians should be familiar with the district's policy on the use of lockers.

Academic & Unified Arts Grading & Schedule

The middle school has four, 45-day marking periods throughout the year. The end of the quarter dates are approximately as follows: 1st quarter ends early November, 2nd quarter ends late January, 3rd quarter ends mid to late March, and 4th quarter ends the last day of the school year.

Grades are generally calculated based on percentages from; tests, quizzes, homework, etc... Teachers will have more detailed information regarding specific grading percentages.

Unified Arts

Schedule and Grading Details

The Unified Arts rotation consists of four separate marking periods. One of the marking periods consists of courses that are taught in a consecutive day format. The following courses are taught using this format: Family & Consumer Science (FCS), Leadership, and STEM in Music. The remaining Unified Arts courses are taught in a "traditional" format, with courses running two days out of a four-day cycle for a 45-day marking period. The traditional courses taught in this format are: Health & Swimming, Computer Science, Art, Music, Technology Education, and PE/Fitness.

The Unified Arts - Art, Consumer Science, STEM in Music, Leadership, Computers, Health, Music, Physical Education, Swimming and Tech Ed are marked "O", "S", or "U". Interim reports are only issued in our "traditional" UA marking period courses, not consecutive day courses. Teachers will communicate with parents if a student is performing unsatisfactory. Arrangements may have to be made between a teacher and a student for makeup work to be completed in the final week of the course.

Parent Teacher Conferences

The middle school has Fall and Spring conferences for parents to meet with teachers, counselors and administration. The Fall conference dates are generally mid to late November. Spring conferences are scheduled in early March. The conferences will have at least one evening available for parents to schedule times. Academic Awards

HONOR ROLL

The Honor Roll designation will be Distinguished Honors (all A's, O's and S's) and Honor Roll (all A's, B's, O's and S's). To qualify for the Academic Awards in June, a student must make the honor roll in the first, second and third marking periods.

PRESIDENTIAL AWARD

The purpose of this award is to recognize academic success in the classroom for 8th grade students upon transition to high school. To be eligible for the Presidential Award for Educational Excellence, students must meet the following two requirements:

- 1) Students must earn all A's in 5th, 6th, 7th, and the first semester of 8th grade.
- 2) Students must score Advanced on the most recent PSSA exam for reading or math.







With its large picture window overlooking the courtyard, open seating areas and extensive electronic collection, the middle school library welcomes our 5th graders to take advantage of all the opportunities available.

The library's resources include over 18,000 items in the print collection and over 2,300 ebooks/ audiobooks in addition to our databases. The one-to-one iPad concept allows the library to exist both as a physical location with traditional copies of books that have been genrified (humor, sports, realistic fiction, fantasy/sci-fi, adventure, historical fiction, and thrills and chills) and displayed using a style known as dynamic shelving, as well as a virtual 24-7 library with electronic resources accessed through the Middle School Library Web page and UMAMS Library app. We recently began hosting a weekly free book give-away as well!

The success of our library depends on our many volunteers. We are always in need of adult volunteers to help. 5th Grade Music Information

BAND

The 5th Grade Band picks up where the 4th Grade Band ended. Students get a short 30-minute lesson each week where they work on learning from the lesson book. They will learn how to better read music and rhythm with their instruments. They will learn how to play with better tone and increase the amount of notes they can play. Students will also have a short 40-minute Full Band Rehearsal each week where they will work on learning songs to play at the 2 concerts throughout the year. 5th grade band members are expected to practice at home regularly to continue growing as a band member. The 5th grade year is all about the journey from exploring a band instrument to the adventure of beginning to master one!

ORCHESTRA

Orchestra students meet each week for a small group lesson and a full orchestra rehearsal. Students are encouraged to practice consistently at home for a total of 60 or more minutes each week. The 5th grade orchestra performs in a winter and spring concert, and for special events during the school year. 5th grade orchestra gives our students the opportunity to develop as musicians, create friendships, and enjoy making music! CHOIR

Chorus is open to any student who likes to sing! Rehearsals are generally once a week after school until 4:15 pm. The choir sings a variety of songs that develop musicianship skills and promote the enjoyment of making music! 5th & 6th grade Chorus performs in a winter and spring concert and often sings at a Reading Fightin' Phils game during baseball season, or other community events.

HANDCHIME ENSEMBLE

The Bell Ensemble is open to all grades, but limited to twelve participants. Experience is not necessary. The ensemble primarily runs during the winter season, playing in the winter concert and community events. Rehearsals are generally before school once a week (7:30 am). There are additional music opportunities as students move through our middle school grades.

5th Grade Activities

These activities are open to 5th graders. There are several more clubs and activities that would be available as students move through our middle school grades. Some clubs may not be currently offered.



COMMUNITY OF CARING CLUB

The Community of Caring Club is the umbrella program that links all activities to create a caring, respectful school environment that supports students as they develop positive character traits and become good citizens. The 5 core values of the Community of Caring are: Caring, Respect, Responsibility, Trust and Family. Students plan service learning projects for the good of our school and community. The Community of Caring Club is open to all students in grades five through eight. Listen to the announcements for information on school-wide activities.

25 BOOK CHALLENGE

Our goal for the 25 book challenge is for every middle school student to read one-million words of text. By competing both individually and by class, each student will have the goal of reading 25 self selected books. Throughout the year, we will be celebrating reading with activities and events. The class who has read the most for each grade level, will be rewarded with various activities at the end of each marking period. At the end of the year every student who has reached the 25 book goal will be entered into a grand drawing for an amazing prize (TBA). Each student will be entered once for every 25 books they have read.

C.R.E.A.T.E. CLUB

CREATE (Culture, Respect, Empathy, Appreciation, Tolerance, Education) is a student action group at Upper Merion Area Middle School whose mission is to make the school community a more inclusive and tolerant environment, as well as promote student activism and leadership.

DRAMA CLUB

If you like to sing, act, or dance, then Drama Club might be for you! Students in grades five through eight may participate in Drama Club. Drama Club's goal is to provide quality productions for the Upper Merion community to enjoy. Rehearsals are after school during the week and some Saturdays. The drama club production is usually in early March. Students are cast in lead roles by audition, but all interested students will be a part of the large ensemble. Registration for Drama Club begins in October. The Stage Crew is also an important part of the club. Students work to build sets, scenery and props for the year's production. Listen to the announcements for information on signing up to join Drama Club.

5th grade campers will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities. Environmental activities may include creek crawling, fishing, exploring, hiking, plant & animal study and many more. Sporting activities may include; ropes courses, climbing, basketball, soccer, tennis, Ga Ga and softball. Other activities include arts & crafts, hay rides, dancing, storybook reading, games, and others. During their stay campers will live in cabins and eat in the dining hall.

INTRAMURALS

After school intramural sessions are held in the fall and spring. Students in grades five and six may participate. Activities vary including, Computers, Water Games, Floor Hockey, Run for Fun, Spanish is Fun, Electronic Music Keyboard, Drama and Introduction to Dance.

JUNIOR OPTIMIST CLUB

The Junior Optimist Club is a service organization that provides opportunities for all middle school students grades five to eight to give back to their community and school. There is a sign-up every fall, but students may continue to join throughout the year. Activities include the school store, talent show, food and necessities drives, school beautification, community fairs, trout rodeo, and fundraisers. There is a volunteer sign-up sheet for each activity.

STUDENT COUNCIL - LOWER HOUSE

Representatives from each homeroom meet one to two times a month to plan activities for grades five and six. Representatives are chosen in September by homeroom. Yearly activities include the Gym and Swim, Holiday Goodie Grams, the Thanksgiving Food Drive, the Read for Ronald service project, and the PSSA snack sale.

SEA PERCH

The Sea Perch Team is an engineering team that designs and constructs underwater remotely operated vehicles. The Greater Philadelphia Sea Perch Challenge is a Naval Engineers sponsored regional competition where middle school teams across the tristate area compete in underwater challenges at Temple University.

ACHIEVERS CLUB

This is an after school activity for students needing

additional organization and tutoring. During Achievers Club students can expect to: Review and organize materials, Receive support with in-class or homework assignments, Have some basic skills re-taught as needed. "Achievers" is based on School Counselor recommendation and limited in total capacity, students usually attend one day out of three (Tues, Wed, Thurs).




Drop off and pick up details

The parent drop-off location is behind the middle school via Crossfield Road (see the Red Arrows). The drop-off area is at the circle and along the side of the building. After the student is dropped off vehicles are to proceed around the circle and exit via Crossfield Road.

Students are not to be dropped off at the front of middle school before 8:00 a.m.

Students arriving late are to be dropped off in the front of the middle school using the main entrance and proceed to the main office to sign in.



Bus Drop-off location

The buses will be using the Keebler Road entrance of the middle school and unloading students at the front of the middle school. The front drop off area is only for buses prior to 8:00 AM.

AFTERNOON TRAFFIC PATTERNS

Parent Pick-up location

The new parent pick-up location is behind the middle school via Crossfield Road. Vehicles are to proceed on the new access road around the new high school. The pick-up area is at the circle and along the sides of the buildings. After the student is picked up, vehicles are to proceed around the circle and exit via Crossfield Road.

Bus loading location

The bus loading area at dismissal is at the front of the middle school. After a few weeks of school, most buses will be assigned a number and loading spot in front of the middle school. The buses will pull into the same location throughout the year.

The safety of our students is a priority during the a.m. drop-off and p.m. pick-up times each day. Thank you for your support and cooperation with our traffic patterns.

Nurse and Medical Services

ADMISSION TO THE MEDICAL SUITE (or "The Nurse")

The school's full-time nurse deals with emergencies and has the responsibility of overseeing the medical records of students. The nurse is willing to work with any student, but the difficulty must be legitimate. Minor or feigned problems detract from the nurse's efforts to help students who need assistance.

Students who need to go to the medical suite must obtain a pass signed by the teacher to whom they are assigned. Except in emergencies, students are not to enter the medical suite between periods. If the nurse feels that any student is abusing this support system for all students, the nurse may request a meeting of the student's parents with appropriate school personnel.

ACCIDENTS

All incidents resulting in injury, whether major or minor, must be reported at once to the adult supervisor in charge of the class or activity. The school nurse will be advised of all accidents, will decide on appropriate treatment and will document each case as required by the Upper Merion Area School District.

Accidents - Students need to provide MD notes if they are not able to participate in gym, swimming or have any other physical restrictions.

Student Accident Insurance - This information is mailed home in the school packet in August. The enrollment form is on the District website, under Parent Resources, along the left hand side near the bottom there's a link for Student Accident Insurance. Parents complete the enrollment form and send along with the payment directly to the address on the enrollment form.

Elevator Use - If a student is injured and has a note from a doctor requiring the use of an elevator, the student should report to the health suite with the appropriate documentation. Students using crutches are required to wear appropriate footwear (no flip flops or sandals).

FIRST AID

Injuries occurring at school will be treated according to procedures approved by the school's medical staff. Parents, after being notified of a student's injury, assume responsibility. Parents may wish to consider enrolling in the student accident insurance program which is available at modest cost. Parents are advised to refrain from asking school personnel to treat injuries that do not occur at school. The medical staff cannot assume that responsibility.

CHILD ABUSE

Any suspected case of child abuse or child neglect will be reported to proper authorities as required by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

EMERGENCY DATA SHEETS

Must be completed yearly and returned the first day of school. Information on the data sheets is confidential. Allergies and medical conditions need to be updated yearly. Changes in a student's health or new medical conditions occurring during the year should be reported to the Health Suite at 610-205-8805 or email Bridget McGuigan: bmcguigan@umasd.org.

Parents need to sign off for Tylenol, Ibuprofen and/or Benadryl (allergic reactions only) to be dispensed during the school day. No medications will be given without the data sheets being signed and dated by parents.

ILLNESS DURING SCHOOL HOURS

Students who become ill during the school day should obtain a pass from the teacher to report to the medical suite. If it is necessary for students to leave school because of illness, parents will be called to provide transportation.

PRESCRIPTIONS AND OTHER MEDICATIONS

The nurse is not permitted to administer medication unless a written order from a physician is provided. Parents or guardians should call the school nurse to discuss special procedures. Medication administration forms are located on the district web page, under parent resources, student health forms for parents and medication policy form.

MEDICATIONS

UM district policy prohibits students from taking or carrying any prescription or over the counter medications on their own, except students with a current order on file that reads that students may carry their inhaler or EpiPen.

. All medications must be dispensed through the Health Suite.

When medication is needed at school:

- Parents must provide the nurse with written documentation from a physician or nurse practitioner to dispense any over-the-counter and/or prescription medications (medication policy form).
- All medications must be provided in the original pharmacy container with original label intact.
- A parent, guardian or other responsible adult must deliver the medication to the health suite.
- All medications need to be picked up at the end of the school year. Medication not picked up will be discarded.
- All physician notes expire at the end of the school year. They need to be renewed at the beginning of each school year. New year: New Form. If your child goes for an annual physical please send a copy to our nurse.

CAMP MEDICATIONS

Procedures for "when medication is needed in school" must be followed. No prescription or over-the-counter medication will be given without the required documentation.

IMMUNIZATIONS

Under Pennsylvania Health Department guidelines, students must have the Tdap and MCV vaccines before they can start 7th grade. These vaccines are usually given during the child's 11-12 year old (6th grade) well visit. Please make sure that you turn in documentation that these immunizations were given.

If your child has frequent occurrences of incontinence, a change of clothes may be kept in the nurse's office in a zip lock bag. We do have a very limited amount of clothing that children may borrow. Please return the clothing, washed to the nurse's office.

Transportation Services



Upper Merion Area School District uses First Student as the student transportation services provider.

First Student's Location Manager is Andre Huertas (andre.huertas@firstgroup.com) and Tami Gesner is their Safety Manager. First Student's phone number during normal business hours (6:00 AM to 6:00PM) is: 610-337-1092

After normal business hours, First Student's 24/7 answering service will take calls to the above number and dispatch them to the appropriate personnel.

First Student will be maintaining the most current transportation information through the FirstView App. Parents are encouraged to download the app, choose the Upper Merion Area School District and enter their student's district ID number. Buses can also be tracked using the FirstView App.

Any student who wishes to ride a bus to go to another student's house must



have a note from a parent/guardian indicating permission to do so. The parent/guardian who has invited the student to visit must also send a note with his/her child granting permission for the visit. An administrator must sign both notes.

When boarding buses, students are to follow directions from staff members who are on duty. Running to buses or crowding through doors is not permitted. While on the bus, students are expected to cooperate with the driver to ensure a safe, pleasant trip. Bus drivers and Administrators reserve the right to assign seats.

Students must remain in seats until the bus comes to a complete stop. Violations of proper conduct at bus stops or while on the bus may result in loss of bus privileges. Video surveillance will occur on school buses and those video recordings may be used for investigative or disciplinary purposes.

Activity Buses

There are four late run Activity Buses. These buses serve students that stay for Achiever's Club, the drama production and various other after school activities. These buses are provided for Upper Merion Middle and High School students combined. Buses generally run at 5:45 PM daily and at 4:30 PM on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Buses are assigned as follows: BRIDGEPORT, BOBWHITE, BELMONT, WEST CONSHOHOCKEN.

Each of these areas are served by "abbreviated" stops. This means that they will not be identical to morning or afternoon school bus stops. A list of the abbreviated bus stops is available through the Transportation Department, and are posted at both schools. Students should check these lists and determine their stop before boarding the bus. Stops are also listed online: https://www.umasd.org/Page/12840.

Food Services

Welcome to 5th Grade Lunch! Very Tasty!

The Middle School cafeteria has several choices of entrees, vegetables, fruits and snack items to choose from. Students should expect that it will take a few days to get used to the new cafeteria. In essence, when they come in, they should grab a tray and then go to one of the four entrée stations for a hot entree: Pizza, Grille, Specialty or Meal Deal. Hot vegetables of the day are at the Specialty and the Meal Deal stations. Cold vegetable choices, Grab and Go's and Salads that count as entrees. To make a meal the tray must have at least one fruit or vegetable and an entrée. However students may take an entrée, 2 fruit if they choose, 2 veggies if they choose, and a milk.

Not all students will be free automatically next year so households should apply for the program at schoolcafe.com (computer or app) after July 1st. Tentatively, the plan is for there to be 3 or 4 choices for lunch every day and at least one of them will be vegetarian.

As of now the lunch meal price is \$3.25 for paid and \$.40 for reduced, but that may increase somewhat before the beginning of the school year. Breakfast is \$2.75 for paid and \$.30 for reduced. If a student doesn't have their money they may charge their meal and Food Service will contact the household regarding payment.

There will be some a la carte items available (we haven't had any for the last 2 years), but it will not be as much as before COVID. Food Services is working on how they will implement

snacks. Breakfast is an important start to the day and will be served each school day. **The Middle School Food Service continues to be peanut free.**

All updates and important info will always be posted on the Food Services pages of the UMASD.org website. All menus are posted there as well. The plan is that all students will have an ID card, which will be scanned in the cafeteria. This will prevent having to touch the pinpads we previously used.

We are paperless with the Free & Reduced Lunch & Breakfast Program. To fill out an application for the Free and Reduced Lunch and Breakfast Program please go to www.paschoolmeals.com. You will need to set up an account and then fill out the form there. Each school office has English and Spanish applications for households without internet access.

Your household may be "directly certified" as eligible for free meals, we will send you email notification in August if that is the case. Otherwise you must fill out an application at the beginning of every year to determine eligibility. Your student(s) has a 30 day "grace period" at the beginning of the school year and will keep their same eligibility during that period of time from the year before after which, if we haven't directly certified your students



or received a new application, we will charge your student(s) beginning on the 31st operating day of the school year (approximately mid-October).

Managing your student's breakfast and lunch money can be done at www.schoolcafe.com beginning on August 1st. If you already have an account on parentonline.net, your student's funds will automatically be transferred to www.schoolcafe.com. You can log onto it with the same user name and password that you have been using for www.parentonline.net.

You will need to set up an account and then use your credit or debit card to add funds. You can set up an account online for free to set any limits and to see what your student is buying. Adding funds to your student's account costs \$1.95 per transaction, however you may still send funds to school with your student to put on an account and there is no fee involved this way.

Please read on for additional important Food Service information...

Following the standards of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010, our grain based products such as bread, pizza crusts, and sub rolls are made with whole grains; all milk is low-fat or fat free; all salad dressings are low-fat, and we do not fry any foods. Please strongly encourage your child to take complete balanced meals that include fruits, vegetables and milk.

Curriculum: Math Acceleration and Big Ideas

Mathematics Acceleration Process for 4th to 5th grade (updated 4/18/2022)

The accelerated 5th grade math class represents a 2-year advancement in mathematics for students who qualify. Students will not only skip 5th grade math, but they will also enter a sequence of math classes where they will take Calculus during their Junior year of High School. Traditionally, the accelerated class of students has been 10% – 15% of our students, which are approximately 30 – 40 students in a grade. If a student meets the criteria listed below in either option, they will have the opportunity to accelerate.

Option #1: School Based Test Scores - 3 years of test scores Combination of scores from the Everyday Math Unit Tests. All available test scores from 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Grade EM4 Unit Test Scores. Your child's scores and a cut score to qualify will be shared in late June.

Option #2: State-Based Test Scores

The Pennsylvania System School Assessment (PSSA) is a standards-based, criterion-referenced assessment, which is given to all students in grades 3 – 8. The scores from these tests provide students, parents, and educators with an understanding of student performance related to the mastery of the PA Core academic standards for each grade level. 4th Grade Math PSSA Test Score. Your child's scores and a cut score to qualify will be shared in late June.

Mathematics Acceleration Identification Process for 5th to 6th grade

The accelerated Pre-Algebra 6th grade math class represents a 2-year acceleration in mathematics for students who qualify. Students will skip 6th grade math and will enter a sequence of math classes where they will take Calculus during their Junior year of High School. Traditionally, the accelerated class of students has been 10% – 15% of our students, which are approximately 30 – 40 students in a grade.

If a student meets the criteria listed below in either option, they will have the opportunity to accelerate.

Option #1: School Based Test Scores - 3 years of test scores All available test scores are from 3rd and 4th Grade EM4 Unit Test Scores. 5th Grade Math report card grades. (Quarter 1, 2, 3, and 4) Your child's scores and a cut score to qualify will be shared in late June.

Option #2: State-Based Test Scores

The Pennsylvania System School Assessment (PSSA) is a standards-based, criterion-referenced assessment, which is given to all students in grades 3 – 8. The scores from these tests provide students, parents, and educators with an understanding of student performance related to the mastery of the PA Core academic standards for each grade level. 5th Grade Math PSSA Test Score. Your child's scores and a cut score to qualify will be shared in late June.

In the Upper Merion Area School District we are proud to offer acceleration in mathematics in 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grade. Each year we use a process specific for each grade level to identify students to accelerate in mathematics.
